DESCRIPTION

CONDITION

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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

One of the most elegant houses in Conway County is the Aycock-Jamell House. Built in 1904, this large residence features a round bay with domed roof, a one-storey porch encircling half the house, and decorative windows of both stained and clear leaded glass. The house is in excellent condition and remains structurally unaltered.

The two-and-one-half storey Aycock-Jamell House has a high hip roof with gable projections on the front and side elevations. A domed roof with finial and dragon-style weather vane tops the tower-like bay at the southeast corner. The house is sheathed in narrow clapboard and rests on a foundation of rough-faced cut stone.

The three gable ends on the front and side elevations are imbricated with scalloped shingles. Recessed in the east and west gable ends are centerpointed arches and rectangular windows with bracketed hoods. Each doublehung window has a geometric pattern in the upper sash. Casement windows, set beneath a heavy entablature and flanked by short square posts, are set into the front gable end,

Encircling the front half of the house is a one-storey flat-roofed porch. Urn-shaped balusters between short, square posts enclose the porch deck. Similar balusters between round Doric columns surround the downstairs porch. Curved handrails are found on both the deck and the lower porch.

The pattern of ornamental brackets and dentils on the porch cornice is continued in the wide belt course around the house. Beneath the wide overhang of the roof are paired scroll brackets on a plain frieze.

The irregular floor plan is accented by projecting bays on the front and side elevations. On the west elevation is a one-storey bay similar to the two-storey front bay. Both bays are three-sided with double-hung sash windows on each face. The front bay windows feature a diamond pattern in the upper sash. The tower-like bay at the southeast corner features three curved windows on the second storey. The most unusual bay is on the west elevation. This one-storey, oval-shaped bay has both curved and flat windows of stained and leaded glass. Stained glass is also found in the sidelights and narrow transom surrounding the single door entry.

The interior features of the Aycock-Jamell House are even more interesting than the exterior. The small vestibule opens into the foyer through a single door with clear beveled glass set in an oval frame. Clear beveled glass also infills the surrounding sidelights and operable transom.

At the rear of the foyer a stairway of imported English walnut leads to the second storey. Curving upward from two small landings, the stairway is lined with slender balusters set between heavy square posts. Like most of the other rooms in the house the foyer still contains its original light fixture. Originally designed for gas, these interesting light fixtures are now operable with electric wiring.

The front parlor, which still retains panels of its original wallpaper, opens onto the foyer through a wide rectangular opening. This west entry features ornamental latticework in a scroll pattern.

Double sliding doors separate the east parlor from the dining room to the north. Archways between the dining room and east bay are infilled with decorative spindle work. This east bay, with its stained and leaded glass windows, is the most picturesque area of the house.

Among the most impressive features are a number of original mantelpieces which reportedly were purchased at the St. Louis World's Fair. Located downstairs in the foyer, library, parlor and dining room are the four most elaborate mantels. These intricately carved mantels feature glazed tile, ornamental hearth covers, and, in two cases, beveled mirrors. The dining room mantel has a small bookshelf enclosed with leaded glass.

Resting on its original corner lot in Morrilton's first fashionable residential district, the Aycock-Jamell House has changed little since its 1904 construction. Continual attention has kept the rich interiors and unusual exterior features in almost perfect condition.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Aycock-Jamell House, completed in 1904, is one of the most architecturally unusual structures in Conway County, Arkansas. The finely detailed interiors, even more intricate than the exterior features, reflect a style unusual and possibly unique in this area of the Arkansas River Valley.

The two-and-one-half storey house is of frame construction with a high hipped and gabled roof. Imbrication in the gable ends, decorative brackets on the porch and roof cornices, and windows with stained, leaded and patterned glass are some of the interesting architectural features. Dominating the exterior is a tower-like bay capped with an elongated dome. Resting on the dome's finial is a dragon-style weathervane.

The interior of the Aycock-Jamell House features highly crafted woodwork in doors, mantels, stairway and decorative grills. According to a descendant of the builder, each of the mantelpieces was purchased at the St. Louis World's Fair, where they had been a part of some of the exhibition buildings. The walnut stairway is said to have been imported from England and reassembled in the house. The original light fixtures, first piped for gas but now operated by electricity, are still in place, as are the original panels of wallpaper in the southeast parlor.

This architecturally interesting structure was built by Elmo Aycock, a Morrilton businessman and entrepreneur. According to his granddaughter, Aycock had visited in St. Louis and was very impressed by the residences he saw there. When he decided to build his home in Morrilton, Aycock hired several skilled German carpenters who were working on houses in St. Louis. The house built by these German craftsmen was quite unusual for central Arkansas.

About 1912 the Aycock family moved to Little Rock, where Mr. Aycock continued his successful business endeavors. According to Mrs. George L. Cunningham, who was born in Morrilton before the turn of the century, the Aycock House was first sold to Captain M. D. Shelby. Another successful Morrilton businessman, Captain Shelby built the city's first cotton oil mill in 1910.

The Aycock House has passed to several owners during its seventy-year existence, and now belongs to the Kassen Jamell family. Like previous occupants of the house, the Jamell's are continuing to maintain the structure in its excellent condition.


