#### Summary

The Guy High School Gymnasium is a single-story building of a rectangular plan with two projecting porches. Constructed in 1938 by the WPA, the Plain Traditional-styled building is covered by a composition-shingled gable roof with Craftsman exposed rafters and a narrow frieze board. The walls consist of structural cut-stone and are supported by a continuous stone foundation. Four interior brick chimneys protrude from the roofline.

#### Elaboration

Projecting gable roof porches at each corner highlight the northern elevation. Both porches are supported by two cut-stone columns, and both have stuccoed pediments. The western porch contains modern, double-leaf glass doors, whereas the eastern porch provides access through a single-leaf wood door with transom. This elevation is lighted by seven, asymmetrically placed, nine-over-nine, double-hung windows.

The eastern elevation is fenestrated by two sets of side-by-side, nine-over-nine, double-hung windows with a stationary nine-pane window directly above each. A single-leaf door is located to the south of these windows, and a single nine-over-nine, double-hung window is positioned near the southern corner. The southern elevation consists of seven boarded-over windows and five sets of side-by-side, three-pane stationary windows placed under the eaves and interrupting the frieze board. As in the eastern elevation, the western elevation is lighted by two sets of side-by-side, nine-over-nine, double-hung windows with a nine-pane stationary window directly above each.

The building is still used as a gymnasium by the Guy-Perkins School District. Noteworthy interior features include a ceiling as opposed to the more common open-rafter gymnasium roof; wood columns, which support the ceiling and separate the playing court from the bleachers; and an inset stage on the north side of the gymnasium.

#### Guy High School Gymnasium

Still in use as a school gymnasium by the Guy-Perkins School District, the Guy High School Gymnasium was built with local labor through the Works Progress Administration in 1938. D. D. Battles, a local resident who recalled working on the building, noted in 1991 that the WPA workers used hand crow bars to dig up huge stones along the nearby North Cadron Creek, then hauled them to the construction site on horse-drawn wagons. The workers then used large scaffolds and iron chains to hoist the heavy stones to the top of the building. Later in the gymnasium's history, air conditioning, indoor plumbing and modern lighting were added. The building is still use as a gymnasium by the Guy-Perkins School District.<sup>1</sup>



The Guy High School Gymnasium, constructed during the period covered by the historic context *The Evolution of the Public School System in the Arkansas Ozarks*, 1920-1940, is a representative example of a large stone school building constructed for a rural school district. Its documented construction by the W.P.A. and its use during this period as a local school building clearly identify it with this historic context and with this property type. It is significant locally under Criterion A through its direct associations with both the history of the evolution of the public school system in the Ozark Mountain region of the state during this period and the W.P.A.
