### SUMMARY

Built circa 1940, the Lee Service Station located in Damascus, Arkansas, is an excellent example of a mixed masonry commercial building veneered by Silas Owens. Predominantly Craftsman in style, this structure borrows freely from other styles, with its cross-gabled moderately-pitched roof and small eave-overhangs. The station exemplifies Owens's work, with its herringbone pattern of rock, quoins at each original corner and a three-in, three-out cream-brick pattern bordering the sides and top of all doors and windows. The sills of all windows are made of brick in a rowlock position. Additions have been made to the building, but do not compromise the original architecture.

### **ELABORATION**

Located at 28 South Broadway in Damascus, Faulkner County, the Lee Service Station was constructed circa '940 for Clayton and Exie Lee. The rock and brick-veneered structure has some of the original windows, but retains all of the original window openings. The original bay was enclosed to enlarge the interior of the store, and a new cinder block bay was built on the north elevation. The building has been used for various purposes, and is currently unoccupied.

### **East Elevation**

The front, or east elevation of the station faces South Broadway. With quoins of cream brick on the corner, it has one large bay window, followed by a door, both surrounded by the cream three-in, three-out brick pattern. Above and to the right of the door is a gable. Centered just below the gable roof is a round window opening surrounded by a starburst pattern of brick in soldier position. The window has been filled in, and a portion of a two-by-four extends where a sign once hung. To the right of the gable, the bay area has been altered to make an extension to the interior. The bay was closed in to make a bay window, leaving only one side of the window with the brick pattern. The corner quoins remain to divide the original store portion from the bay of the building. Following this, the newer cinder-block bay lies with the entrance facing the street. A concrete drive runs in front of portions of the building, though some of it is covered in gravel and grass.

### North Elevation

The cinder-block addition has four two-over-two windows. The gable end is made of vertical lumber with a large centered window.

### **Vest Elevation**

The west elevation completes the cinder-block addition with an enclosed bay door, and a smaller door in its place. Following is the original structure, containing three windows. The first has been enclosed with

plywood, and the second is of the same size, but has the original six-over-six window in place. The third is much smaller, and has also been enclosed. Above the original window, an attic apartment was added, with a small wooden deck and staircase. The staircase and deck are rapidly deteriorating, leaving only the attic entrance as proof of the alteration to the original structure. A concrete slab runs the length of this elevation to the point of the beginning of the attic staircase.

#### South Elevation

The south elevation contains all of the original openings, with no additions. Centered above the gable is a small sliding window. There are two doors with a small window between, which has been enclosed. The window is nearer to one door, and has too little space to carry the three-in, three-out pattern on that side. The south elevation also contains a bay window toward the front of the station. A concrete sidewalk runs from ront to back.

#### INTEGRITY

The Lee Service Station, built circa 1940, retains integrity. The location and setting have not changed. The design has not significantly changed, and neither has the workmanship. Though it is now vacant, it still appears ready for business, just as it did when Silas Owens completed his work on the mixed masonry Craftsman style service station.

#### SUMMARY

Constructed circa 1940, the Lee Service Station is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local **significance** under **Criterion** C as the only example of a Craftsman style mixed-masonry service station in Damascus. The service station, located in Damascus, Faulkner County, Arkansas, was veneered by Silas Owens at the height of his career as a mason. This nomination is being submitted under the multiple property context "A Storm Couldn't Tear Them Down: The Mixed-Masonry Buildings of Silas Owens, Sr., 1938-1955."

#### ELABORATION

The Lee Service Station in Damascus was built circa 1940, for Clayton and Exie Lee of Damascus. Silas Owens, a local African-American mason, veneered the structure adding his signature features to the exterior, found in the cream brick three-in, three-out pattern, quoins and herringbone rock pattern.

The Lees sold grocery items, general merchandise, and gasoline under the name Conoco. The bay also allowed standard vehicle servicing. The station's location on U.S. 65, a major highway across Arkansas, meant a steady stream of customers for the Lees. When the Lees grew closer to retirement, in the late 1950s, they sold the business to Dick Mayhan. Mayhan transformed the rear of the building into a barbershop. The service station saw many other uses, including a restaurant and flea market before lying vacant, waiting for another occupant.

Robert Loyd who grew up in Damascus and remembers the Lees, now owns the building. Loyd is waiting for another business to move in and utilize the space. The Lees have since passed away, and have no children to carry on their story of the station.

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Constructed circa 1940, the Lee Service Station is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance under Criterion C as the only example of a Craftsman style mixed-masonry service station in Damascus. The service station, located in Damascus, Faulkner County, Arkansas, was veneered by Silas Owens at the height of his career as a mixed-mason. #### VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

From the northeast corner of the Lewis Drive and Highway 65 intersection, proceed northeasterly 160 feet along the northeast side of US 65 North to the point of beginning. From the point of beginning, proceed northeasterly 60 feet, thence proceed northwesterly 80 feet, thence proceed southwesterly 60 feet, thence proceed southwesterly 80 feet to the point of beginning.
