SUMMARY

The circa 1948 Merritt House in Greenbrier is an example of rock veneer applied by local Faulkner County mason Silas Owens, Sr. The one-story residence exhibits Craftsman style details and is a representative illustration of Mixed Masonry veneer applied to frame structures.

ELABORATION

The Merritt House is located at 139 North Broadview/ US Highway 65 South in Greenbrier. The house has an irregular plan on a cast concrete foundation and is an example of mixed masonry veneer applied over an existing wood frame structure. The house features a gable and gable on hip roof covered with composition shingles. An attached garage is original to the house, but a secondary free-standing two-story garage was constructed circa 1990 by Silas Owens, Sr.'s, son, Silas Owens, Jr., to the southwest of the house. The original fenestration has been replaced with vinyl windows, but the size and massing remain as they were initially.

The front, eastern façade features a dominant front gabled porch with a wide arched entrance, demonstrative of the Craftsman influence. The poured concrete porch floor leads to a single-leaf front door flanked by full-length sidelights. The paneled door includes two lights in the upper panels. Immediately to the north of the entry is the house's chimney, rising through the gabled porch roof and accented with cream brick at the corners. From the porch, the front façade steps back to a second gable face containing a bay window with three six-over-six, double-hung windows. Rectangular louvers surrounded by Owens' signature three-three brick pattern are located in each gable eave.

The northern elevation of the Merritt House includes from east to west a pair of double-hung six-over-six pane windows, a smaller single six-over-six window, and two more pairs of double-hung, six-over-six configuration windows. A northern-facing cross-gable intersects the main gable above the eastern-most pair of windows.

The rear, western elevation is dominated by a shed roof extension of the house's gabled roof covering a cast concrete patio. From north to south, the fenestration consists of a single double-hung six-over-six window adjacent to the covered patio. Under the shed roof, a smaller, single six-over-six and a pair of double-hung twelve pane windows are sheltered from the elements. Two more individual double-hung six-over-six windows line the rear elevation to the south of the patio in the attached garage. It is on this portion of the rear elevation that Owens' signature herringbone pattern is most visible in the coursing of the rocks. The roofline of the garage is a wide gable running east to west with square, cream brick surrounded louvers just below the apex of each gable.

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The focus of the southern elevation is the protruding one-car attached garage, original to the Merritt House, which contains two double-hung, six-over-six windows. The southern elevation continues east recessing to the exterior wall of the house. A flat roof covers the walkway from the driveway to a secondary entrance and rests on a single metal post. Under the flat roof is a small six-over-six window on the southern wall. This wall also features a pair of double-hung twelve pane windows directly under the cross-gable and rectangular louver. At the eastern end of the southern elevation, the gabled front porch is open.

The southern end of the front, eastern façade features an attached garage recessed substantially from the front porch and the main entrance to the house. The garage has one bay with a synthetic solid garage door and a double-hung six-over-six window directly to the north of the bay. The flat roof supported by a single metal post is also visible on the front façade, as is an original cream brick trimmed arch leading to a secondary entrance. The doorway is recessed behind the arch, providing a covered entry.

Integrity

The Merritt House is a fine example of Silas Owens, Sr.'s, craftsmanship and detailing as one of Faulkner County's most identifiable masons. The arched entries, cream colored brick trim around windows and doors, and the herringbone pattern in the stone veneer are prominent features of the house and characteristic of Owens' work. The Merritt House retains integrity because of its unaltered architectural style and retention of the original fenestration size and massing.

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Criterion C: Architecture, Local Significance

SUMMARY

Constructed in 1948, the Merritt House in Greenbrier is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C with local significance as a good example of a Minimal Traditional style Mixed Masonry residence featuring Craftsman-influenced details. The house was veneered in cut sandstone by Faulkner County mason Silas Owens, Sr., and includes the herringbone pattern of laid stone and cream brick door and window surrounds that are distinctive of Owens' work. The nomination is being submitted under the multiple property context statement, "A Storm Couldn't Tear Them Down: The Mixed Masonry Buildings of Silas Owens, Sr., 1938-1955."

ELABORATION

Billy Merritt commissioned Silas Owens, Sr., to build a Mixed Masonry residence for his family on US Highway 65 South in Greenbrier. Mr. Merritt was the second generation Merritt to hire Owens – both his father and his uncle were proud owners of Mixed Masonry houses rocked by the master craftsman from Faulkner County. In fact, many of the cut stones used in Billy Merritt's house were pulled from his father's house up the road when it was demolished in the mid-1940s. The remaining rocks were quarried at Batesville Mountain, according to Mr. Merritt's son, Larry Merritt, who is the present owner of the family home. Mr. Merritt also hauled stone from various other locations in the vicinity of Greenbrier.

The younger Merritt remembers the day Silas Owens, Sr., arrived with a crew of four men to cover the wood frame structure with cut stone veneer. The veneer was added over the clapboard exterior to provide stability and less maintenance. Larry Merritt, who was nine years old at the time, remembers Owens as the first black man he had seen.

Both Billy Merritt and his son Larry worked for Arkansas Power and Light. The elder was a lineman in Faulkner County soon after electricity was made available to the rural parts of the county. Unlike many Mixed Masonry homeowners in Central Arkansas, this branch of the Merritt family did not depend on farming for their livelihood. Billy Merritt traveled around the county and region in his position with AP&L.

Currently, the Merritt House is used as a rental property. Larry Merritt retains ownership of the property, although he and his wife reside in Conway. An addition was made to the property circa 1990 in the form of a two-story, gambrel roof garage and apartment. Fittingly, the masonry exterior was laid by Silas Owens, Jr., son of the original mason, in a similar pattern and configuration as that done by his father. The garage building is a non-contributing structure on the Merritt property.

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Statement of Significance

The Merritt House, located in Greenbrier, is a fine example of the Mixed Masonry craftsmanship of Silas Owens, Sr., in Faulkner County. Owens also constructed several other Mixed Masonries for the Merritt family in the vicinity. The structure is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C with local significance because of its characteristic Owens' construction. Cream brick window and door surrounds, wide arched porches, and the distinct herringbone pattern found in the stone coursing signify the Merritt House as the work of Silas Owens, Sr. The fact that the stone on the Merritt House was taken in part from another earlier residence built by Owens strengthens its significance. The Merritt House is being submitted under the multiple property context "A Storm Couldn't Tear Them Down: The Mixed Masonry Buildings of Silas Owens, Sr., 1938-1955."

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Verbal Boundary Description

From the northwest corner of the intersection of U.S. Highway 65 South and Oak Hill Road, proceed north approximately 701 feet to the point of beginning. From the point of beginning, continue 124 feet north, then 165 feet westerly. From the northwest corner of the property, advance south 124 feet, then 165 feet easterly back to the point of beginning.

Verbal Boundary Justification

The nominated property includes the entire parcel historically associated with the Merritt House.
