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SUMMARY

The Tuckerman Water Tower is located at the south end of Front Street in the small town of Tuckerman, Jackson County, in northeastern Arkansas. The tower is located at the city's waterworks complex, and was built by the Pittsburgh Des Moines Steel Company with assistance from Public Works Administration (PWA) in 1935.

ELABORATION

The Tuckerman Water Tower is located at the south end of Front Street in the small town of Tuckerman, Jackson County, in northeastern Arkansas. The tower is located at the city's waterworks complex, and was built by the Pittsburgh Des Moines Steel Company with assistance from Public Works Administration (PWA) in 1935.


he water tower, which is painted gray, is supported by four metal latticed legs that slope inwards towards me tower as they rise. Metal crosspieces and rods provide lateral rigidity and support between the legs. At the center of the tower a large metal pipe conveys the water to and from the tank.

The water tank has a bowl-shaped bottom that is pierced in the center by the large pipe. A metal walkway with metal pipe handrail around the base of the tank accesses a ladder that ascends the tower's southwestern leg. The walls of the tank are constructed of pieces of curved sheet metal and the southwest side has the word "TUCKERMAN" painted in large black letters on it. The top of the tower is crowned by a metal conical roof.

Integrity

The Tuckerman Water Tower retains good integrity. The water tower has not been altered. In addition, the setting of Tuckerman remains a small town, much as it would have been when the water tower was built.

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SUMMARY

The Tuckerman Water Tower is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance under Criterion C as a good example of a 1930s water tower, and as the last Public Works Administration (PWA)-built water tower remaining in Jackson County. The Tuckerman Water Tower is also being nominated to the National Register under Criterion A for its associations with the activities of the PWA in Jackson County during the 1930s. The Tuckerman Water Tower is being submitted to the National Register of Historic Places under the multiple-property listing "An Ambition to Be Preferred: New Deal Recovery Efforts and Architecture in Arkansas, 1933-1943."

ELABORATION

Little is known about the early settlement of Jackson County other than the first settlers arrived in the area for to 1830. The population was sizable enough that Jackson County was created on November 5, 1829, by territorial legislature. Originally, Jackson County also included almost all of Woodruff County as well until it was separated in 1862. The original county seat was established at Litchfield in 1832, but in 1839 it was moved to Elizabeth. In 1852 it was moved to Augusta and then on to Jacksonport in 1853. (The county seat was moved to Newport, its current location, in 1891-1892.)

As the construction of railroad lines began in earnest in Arkansas after the Civil War, it spurred settlement along its routes, including the Tuckerman area of Jackson County. Historic railroad maps of the area show that a railroad line was in the planning stages in 1864 and 1872.² The railroad line, which would become the St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern in 1874, was completed by 1873.³ Tuckerman's post office was established in 1872, likely as the railroad was being constructed.⁴

After Tuckerman was founded, the town grew at a fairly steady pace. By the late 1880s, according to the *Biographical and Historical Memoirs of Northeast Arkansas*, "Tuckerman, on the Iron Mountain Railway...is comprised of a post-office, three general stores, two groceries, two drug stores, two blacksmith and wood shops, one hotel, two boarding-houses, a school-house, a church, two saw-mills and cotton-gins combined, and has a population of 150." 5

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Due to the continued growth of the community, by the first part of the twentieth century, it was determined that Tuckerman needed a water tower. The creation of the PWA under Franklin Delano Roosevelt's New Deal programs gave Tuckerman the perfect opportunity to get a waterworks. An application was made for PWA assistance in 1934, and the project was allotted a \$38,067 loan and an \$11,862 grant on July 18, 1934. (The estimated total cost for the project was \$49,929.) On September 25, 1934, a contract for \$45,225 was finalized.⁶

Construction began on the water tower, which was built by the Pittsburgh Des Moines Steel Company, on January 17, 1935, and proceeded quickly. The water tower was finished on April 30, 1935. Since the water tower was put into service, the community has continued to use the facility, and has built additional buildings to meet the community's needs, although they are not included in this nomination.

Le PWA was an important part of Arkansas's New Deal history, and the Tuckerman Water Tower is a living reminder of the PWA's importance in providing jobs and development in Arkansas's communities. The Tuckerman Water Tower is a good example of a 1930s-era water tower built by the PWA, and illustrates the activities of the PWA in the early twentieth century. The survival and continued preservation of the Tuckerman Water Tower is a monument to the dedication of the Tuckerman community.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Tuckerman Water Tower is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance under Criterion C as a good example of a 1930s water tower, and as the last PWA-built water tower remaining in Jackson County. The Tuckerman Water Tower is also being nominated to the National Register under Criterion A for its associations with the activities of the PWA in Jackson County during the 1930s. The Tuckerman Water Tower is being submitted to the National Register of Historic Places under the multiple-property listing "An Ambition to Be Preferred: New Deal Recovery Efforts and Architecture in Arkansas, 1933-1943."
