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Summary

The Matthews-Dillon House's prominent chimney and steeply-pitched gable roof are characteristics associated with the English Revival style, but the overall massing of the house, as well as many of the details, suggest its designs was inspired more by 17th century colonial American architecture than by the English originals. The picturesque nature of the house's design is enhanced by the brickwork's "oozing" mortar joints.

Elaboration

Viewed from the east, the Matthews-Dillon House has a tall, narrow "saltbox" profile very reminiscent of 17th century Colonial American houses with English antecedents. The house's steeply-pitched, side-gabled roof with one small front-facing cross gable adds to this impression, as does the front porch, where the door is flanked by very small, multi-paned windows. The absence of any eave overhang is another characteristic of 17th century Colonial architecture. The prominent chimney that breaks through the main (north) facade's eave line, however, is more typical of the English Revival style, as is the use of stucco for the house's gables.

Unusually tall, narrow, multi-paned windows--both casements and double-hung sashes--distinguish the main facade, again underscoring the influence of 17th century Colonial architecture. Six-over-six, double-hung windows of standard 1920's proportions are used elsewhere in the house.

At the rear of the house, two shed-roofed dormers of different sizes project from the "saltbox" section of the roof, which extends down over a porch that has been enclosed. The differences in the dormers' designs may be a picturesque conceit, intended to suggest the dormers were added at different times in the "history" of this "17th century" house. A broad cross gable at the rear of the house adds depth to the house, which otherwise--like many 17th century Colonial homes--would be just one-room deep.

Like several of its Edgemont neighbors, the Matthews-Dillon House has a mixture of interior features that do not "match" its exterior architectural style. The living room's fireplace mantel, for example, is patterned after the 18th century Adam style, and heavily-textured plaster walls add a "Spanish" touch. Arched doorways, the ubiquitous Edgemont feature, also are present.

Behind the house stands an original two-story outbuilding designed to accommodate two cars on

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Summary

Criteria A and C, local significance

One of the first three houses completed in "Edgemont in Park Hill," the Matthews-Dillon House is architecturally significant because it represents an uncommon period revival style: medieval English architecture as it was translated during the 17th century in the American colonies. Despite its distinctive architecture, the house, which was built speculatively in 1928 by the Justin Matthews Company, suffered the same fate as several other Edgemont houses in not being sold until the effects of the Depression began to wane in the 1940's.

Elaboration

The Matthews-Dillon is one of the three completed houses pictured in a 1928 promotional brochure for "Edgemont in Park Hill." Its photo is labeled simply, "New home in Edgemont." The house did not sell, and in July of 1930, Metropolitan Trust Company leased it to Mr. and Mrs. A. Frank Reed, who agreed to pay rent of \$80 per month. The Reeds were the first of a list of at least six tenants who rented the house over the next twelve years. In June of 1942, the house finally sold, but its new owners apparently never occupied it and sold it less than two years later, in February of 1944, to Velda Dillon.


Mrs. Dillon occupied the house for forty-six years, until her death early in 1990 at the age of ninety-one. She made her living in the millinery business, operating the millinery concession at a Little Rock specialty store, M.M. Cohn, in conjunction with a friend, Nora Nash. Mrs. Nash's son remembers Mrs. Dillon's story of obtaining a mortgage from Union Trust Company (now Union National Bank), where she reportedly was told she was receiving the largest loan the bank ever had made to a woman.

Its unusual architecture style establishes the Matthews-Dillon House's architectural significance, while its place as one of Edgemont's first three houses—and as one of the houses that was not sold until the 1940's--underscores its significance with relationship to the development of Edgemont.

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
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the ground level with maid's quarters above. The outbuilding shares the same brick veneer, stuccoed gables, and six-over-six, double-hung windows as the main house.




Mathews. Dillon House, 701 Skyling Dr. North Lither Rock, AR Chayl Nichels


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




