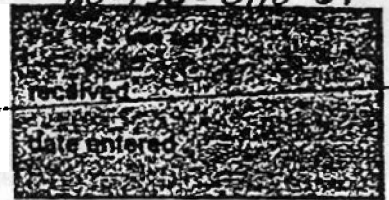

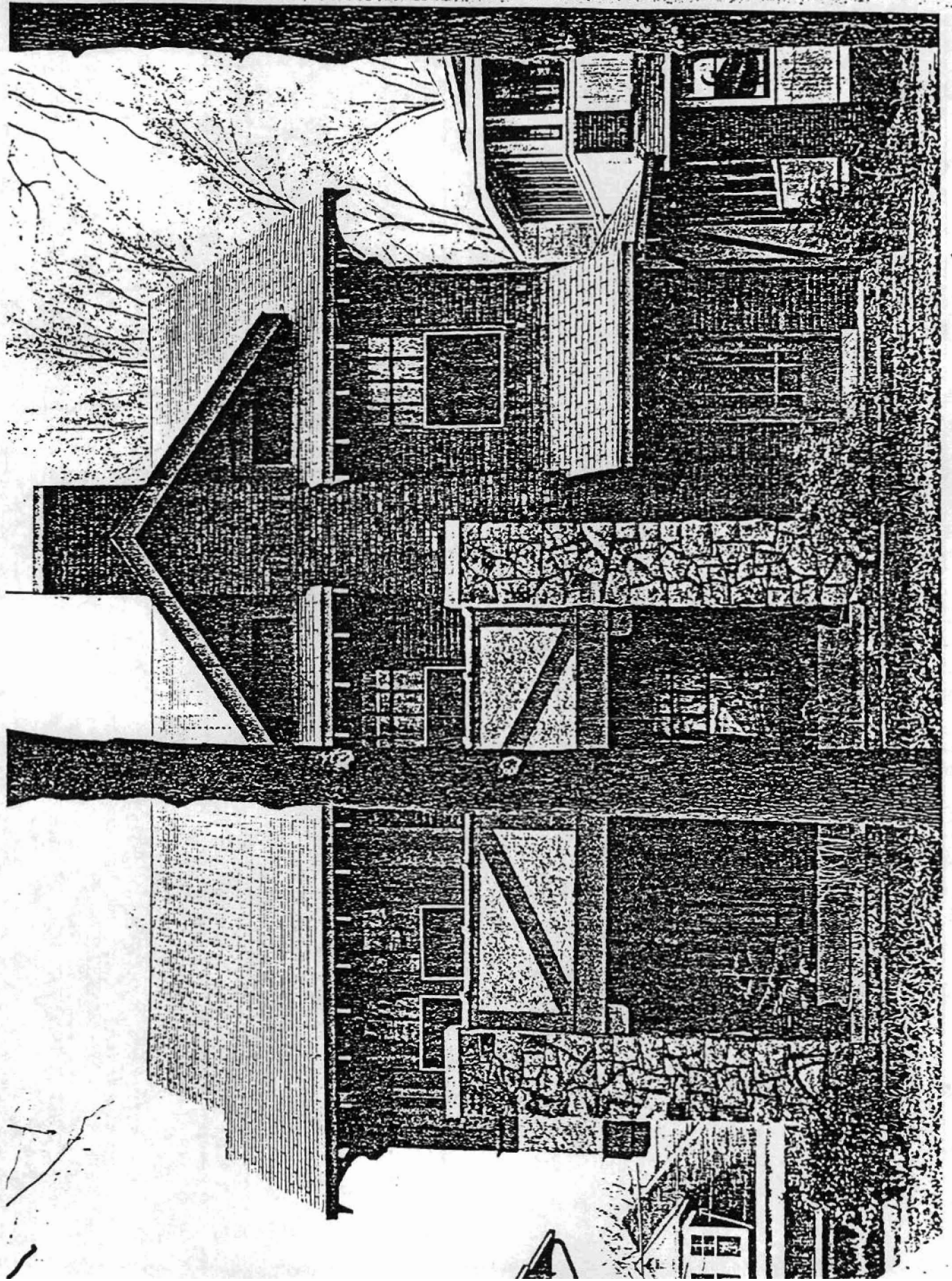

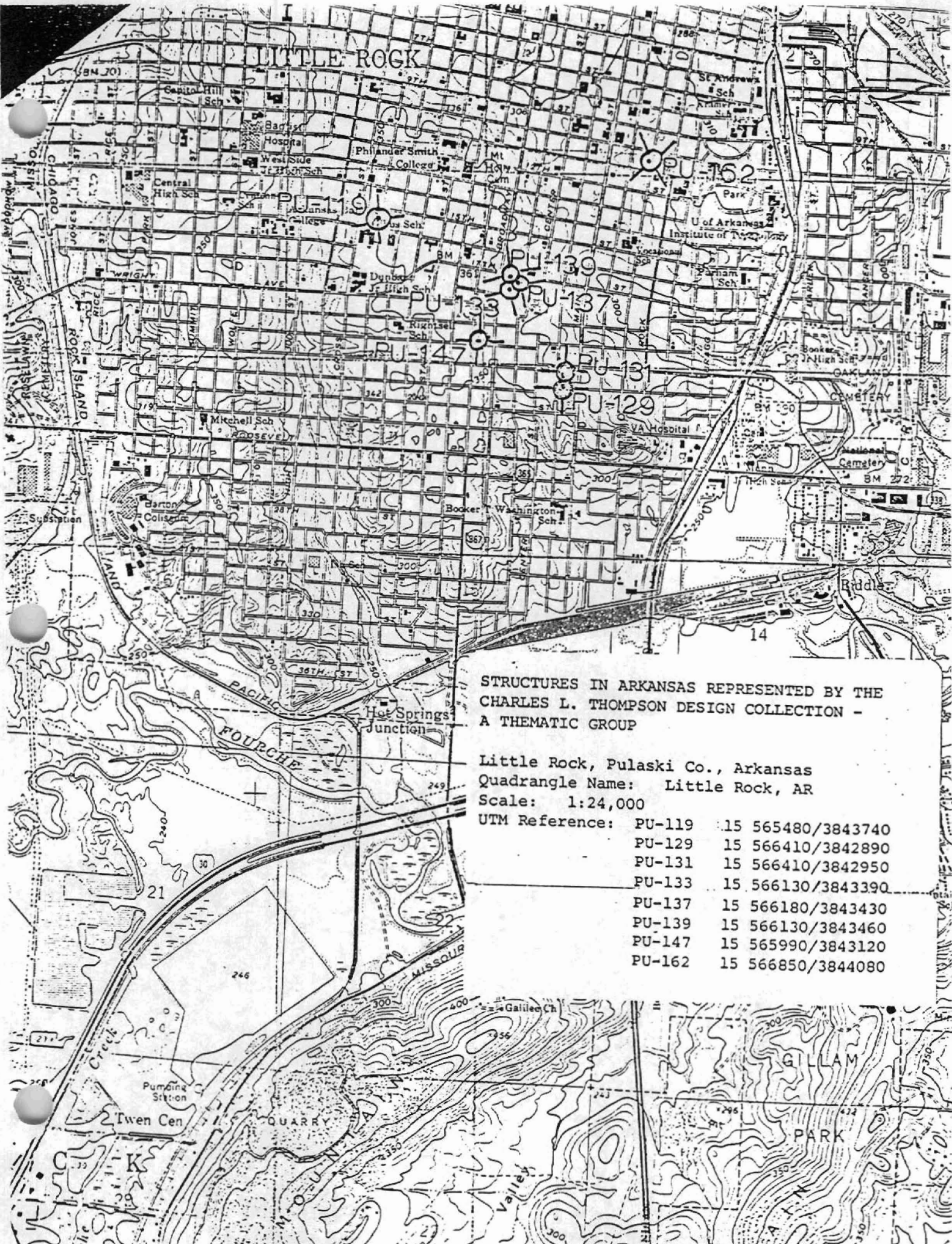
Physical Description

Sited on a narrow, slightly elevated lot in a residential section near the Governor's Mansion, this two-story house was designed by the Thompson and Harding firm in 1917. The deep, shaded front porch supported by large fieldstone piers is the dominant interest of the facade and provides the seclusion and privacy not afforded by the grounds. A steep two-story gable end roof crowns the house which is faced with dark brown brick. A front cross gable through which the exterior chimney protrudes provides a picturesque note, along with the pseudo half-timbering which faces the parapet of the front porch. Sash windows have six-over-one lights.

Statement of Significance

The Craftsman Style structure is one of the three multi-family dwellings designed by the Thompson and Harding firm in 1917 for H. L. Rummel. This two-story brick house was designed to function as a multi-family structure, while fitting unobtrusively into the single-family residential neighborhood of the Governor's Mansion Historic District. It is an excellent example of the firm's attention to the needs of the setting as well as the client.
