

Physical Description

The large size, the great amount of ornamentation and the finely crafted details make this impressive house the luxury model of Charles Thompson's popular two-story foursquare house design. The usual elements seen in most of the foursquare houses are all here including high brick foundations, tall hipped roof with flared eaves, a full-length front porch, the facing of narrow weatherboards. In addition to the large main block a rectangular, slightly recessed two-story wing on the south increases the overall dimensions of this house. Distinguishing this house from the more modest versions are many finely crafted decorative details such as cornerboards in the form of fluted pilasters capped by cyma recta moldings; unfluted Ionic columns with attic bases which support the full entablature of the porch, which is decorated with a dentil molding and curved brackets. A wide entablature with dentil molding wraps the entire house. Decorative dormers with pediment gable roofs and dentil moldings project from the roof on each elevation, a pair of them appearing on the front. The front door has beveled glass window and sidelights. All windows are of the sash variety with one-over-one lights. This large, impressive house is a prominent landmark at the corner of 17th Street and Broadway in Little Rock. It vas designed ca. 1900.

Statement of Significance

The house located at 1700 Broadway in Little Rock was constructed ca. 1900 by Charles L. Thompson. Thompson again used his popular plan for the foursquare design including the elements of tall hipped roof and a full-length front porch. This house is representative of the "luxury version" of the basic foursquare plan, using ornamentation and impressive detail work. The house features cornerboards in the form of fluted pilasters, Ionic columns supporting the porch and a wide entablature with dentil molding around the entire house. Each elevation features decorative dormers with pediment gable roofs and dentil moldings. Resting on a corner lot on one of Little Rock's most historic streets, the French-England House remains identical to its original design.
