Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the eastern edge of Spring Street with a perpendicular line running parallel with the house's southern elevation and located approximately 25 feet to the south thereof, proceed easterly along the latter line for a distance of approximately 100 feet to its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel with the building's eastern elevation; thence proceed northerly along said line for a distance of approximately 100 feet to its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel with the building's northern elevation; thence proceed westerly along said line for a distance of approximately 100 feet to its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the eastern edge of Spring Street; thence proceed southerly along said line for a distance of approximately 100 feet to the point of beginning.

The Bud Fendley House is a single-story, wood frame and brick veneer residence designed in the Craftsman style. Its fundamentally rectangular floor plan is augmented only by the lower, gable roof front porch on its western elevation and the low, brick wall enclosure that connects the front of the porch with the front of the house proper. A single exterior brick chimney that rises well above the roofline is attached to the northern wall near the front. The asphalt shingle, gable roof and brick veneer walls are supported upon a continuous brick foundation.

The western or front elevation is composed of the projecting, gable roof porch and the front wall of the house proper. The porch roof is supported upon two large, square brick columns that in turn are connected by a low, brick balustrade that continues beyond the columns to the south, then turns at a right angle to intersect with the house's front wall to form an enclosed patio. The porch pediment is ornamented with a combination of decorative knee braces and applied wood strips, painted white. It is otherwise blank. The large horizontal beam that carries the weight of the porch roof is painted white. The pediment of the house's front wall behind is identical to the porch pediment in decoration. The wall beneath the porch ceiling features a pair of three-over-one wood sash windows to the north and a single-leaf entrance to the south. The wall surface to the south of the porch is also fenestrated by a pair of identical windows. The eastern elevation opposite features the same pediment decoration earlier, though the central vertical wood strip is interrupted by a rectangular, louvered metal attic vent. The wall below is fenestrated by a single central three-over-one window that is flanked to the south by a larger, single three-over-one wood sash window and to the north by a single-leaf entrance and another three-over-one wood sash window.

The southern elevation is fenestrated with two pair of three-over-one wood sash windows placed centrally and to the west, with another single identical window to the east. The northern elevation opposite is fenestrated with two smaller three-over-one wood sash windows that flank the chimney -- which rises through an otherwise blank wall dormer -- and a larger pair of identical sash windows that light the wall toward the west. The elevation is finished by another small three-over-one wood sash window.

Significant exterior details are limited to the brick piers and low brick wall that support the porch roof and enclose the raised concrete deck of the patio; the characteristic decorative knee braces that ornament the broad eaves extending from all gable ends; the vertical decorative wood strips that also adorn the gable ends; and the exposed rafters that extend along all side gable walls.

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Significance

Criterion C, local significance

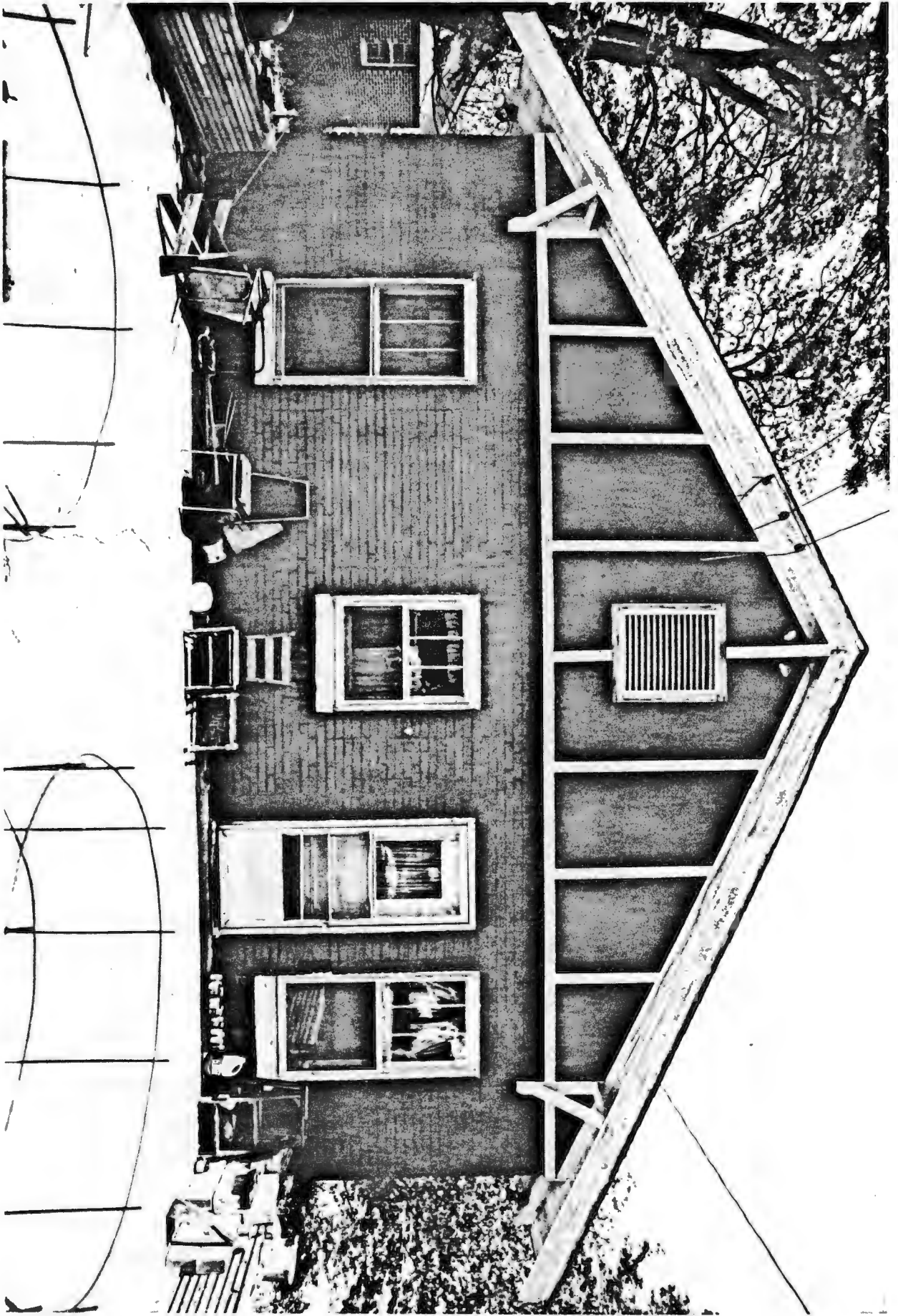
The Bud Fendley House was constructed around 1928 by a Mr. Bud Fendley, its first resident. Unfortunately, little else is known about Mr. Fendley or his involvement in either Marshall or Searcy County.

The Bud Fendley House was constructed as a private residence on Spring Street, near the courthouse square. Though little is known about Bud Fendley, its builder and first resident, its construction date of 1928 and its clear Craftsman style represent the historic context *Searcy County in the World War Era, 1910-1945: Economic Realignment, The Great Depression and World War*. Though this was, generally speaking, a period of county-wide economic decline, some construction continued. With the long-standing presence of the railroad and the growing influence of the automobile, it was inevitable that new, national architectural styles would be reflected. As a particularly good example of the Craftsman style, and the most intact example in the community of Marshall, the Bud Fendley House is locally significant under Criterion C.
