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Description

The T. M. Ferguson House is a single-story, wood-frame residence constructed from 1900 to 1903 in the Plain Traditional style. Supported by a continuous stone foundation, the frame walls are clad with white-painted, lapped weatherboard. A low-pitched hipped roof, which is sheathed by two different types of metal depending on the elevation (ribbed with a standing seam and corrugated), covers the rectangular plan. There are two interior brick chimneys.

The front, or eastern, elevation features a central-bay, hipped-roof porch supported by a collection of posts, including two of the turned, Folk Victorian variety (one at the rear), one simple replacement post, and two builder-inspired composite posts at the corner consisting of two 2" X 4" boards with three pointed wood blocks placed in between. The central, single-leaf entrance is unadorned. Fenestration on this elevation is accomplished by two two-over-two double-hung windows on the wall north of porch and two one-over-one double-hung windows south of the porch.

The southern elevation consists of one boarded-over window near the eastern corner and a pair of one-over-one windows near the western corner. The rear, or western, elevation has a shed-roof porch supported by five wood posts extending from the southern half of the facade. There is a single door at each end of the porch and a one-over-one window in between. The northern half of the elevation is lighted by a two-over-two double-hung window and a small, bathroom-sized window. The northern elevation is identical to the southern elevation in arrangement; however, the paired windows have two-over-two sashes and the boarded-over window now emits a stove pipe.

The interior was not viewed.

Located on Canaan Street in Marshall, the T. M. Ferguson House is in fair condition.

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Significance

This residence was constructed from 1900 to 1903 by T. M. Ferguson as a home for him and his wife, Malinda. Although possessing no historical significance, the T. M. Ferguson house is architecturally significant under Criterion C as the best example in Marshall of this particular Plain Traditional form with its charismatic hipped roof.
