### Description

The Sam Marshall House is a single-story, wood log residence of traditional log construction, apparently hewn, and with half-dovetail notching. The floor plan is rectangular with a recessed, full-width porch at its northern end. There are no extant chimneys. The metal roof and wood log walls rest upon a continuous stone foundation.

The sides and rear of this structure — the eastern, western and southern elevations — are all virtually identical. Each is fenestrated with a symmetrically-placed pair of four-over-four wood sash windows and unrelieved by any other features or detail. The northern or front elevation, beneath the porch, is accessed via a single-leaf door placed off-center to the west and fenestrated with two wood sash windows. The porch pediment is finished with vertical boards and supported upon a total of three irregularly-placed wood columns set on stone piers.

Apart from the columns, there are no exterior details of note.

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#### Significance

The Sam Marshall House — constructed in 1929 and named for its builder and original occupant — is the only known example of traditional log construction from this late era that survives in Searcy County. Though little is known about Sam Marshall, its builder and first resident, its construction date of 1929 and its half-dovetail, traditional log construction represent the historic context Searcy County in the World War Era, 1910-1945: Economic Realignment, The Great Depression and World War. Though this was, generally speaking, a period of county-wide economic decline, some construction continued. With the long-standing presence of the railroad and the growing influence of the automobile, it was inevitable that new, national architectural styles would be reflected; and thus buildings of this traditional construction type are unusual for this period. As a particularly good example of later log construction — when the larger hardwood timbers had largely disappeared and smaller logs became the norm — the Sam Marshall House is locally significant under Criterion C.
