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SUMMARY

The stone on the Walter Patterson House in Clinton was laid up by Silas Owens, Sr., in the Craftsman style. The Mixed Masonry one-story, gable-roofed house with partial basement underwent a slight alteration in the early 1990s on the front porch when the Arkansas Highway and Transportation Department acquired the land up to the porch. At that time the porch supports were changed to columns of cream brick and the southwest corner was slightly beveled to conform to the new property lines.

ELABORATION

The circa 1946 Walter Patterson House, which is situated north of Clinton's city center prominently features rock mason Silas Owens, Sr.'s, herringbone pattern in its stone coursing. A rectangular floor plan with partial basement accommodating the lay of the land displays Craftsman styling in wide overhangs, paired windows and a large gabled front porch.

Western Elevation

The front, western façade is fenestrated at the northwest corner with a pair of three-over-one double-hung Craftsman sash windows. The front wall of the house is recessed under the gable-roofed front porch, which shades a single-leaf, one-light door with diamond shaped panes and a second pair of windows on the southwest corner. A second single-leaf door opens under the porch from the northern wall. The porch is supported by two columns of smooth-faced cream bricks stamped with the brand name, Mabco.

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Northern Elevation

The northern elevation is fenestrated at the northwest corner with a pair of windows. A small gabled extension sheathed in vertical wood siding projects from the main wall approximately two feet. The extension contains an interior fireplace ventilated by a metal chimney. Two pairs of one-over-one windows open east of the fireplace. The main wall steps back approximately two feet and a single one-over-one window punctuates the wall. A rear frame addition with beveled siding on a concrete foundation extends from the original stone wall and is lit by two short one-over-one windows.

Eastern Elevation

The rear, eastern frame addition is fenestrated by a ribbon of six one-over-one windows.

Southern Elevation

Fenestration on the frame addition at the southeast corner of the home consists of a pair of oneover-one windows and a single-leaf paneled door with one light reached by five steps. The original stone section of the home mirrors the northern elevation with a single-one-over-one window along a span of wall recessed from the remainder of the elevation. Two pairs of three-over-one windows fenestrate the wall from east to west. Four concrete steps provide access to the front porch from the southwest corner.

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SUMMARY

The Walter Patterson House is constructed in the Craftsman style with a gabled front porch and partial basement. Despite being one of the less elaborate forms of the Mixed-Masonry produced by Silas Owens, Sr., his trademark herringbone coursing in the stone veneer is very prominent and meticulously executed. The nomination is being submitted under the multiple property context, "A Storm Couldn't Tear Them Down: The Mixed Masonry Buildings of Silas Owens, Sr., 1938-1955."

ELABORATION

Very little is known about the Walter Patterson House. The construction date is estimated to be circa 1946 according to paperwork in the possession of former owner Duane Richards of North Little Rock. The area of the home is north of downtown Clinton and Archey's Fork at the intersection of US 65 and Arkansas Highway 16. There are two Mixed-Masonry houses and one Mixed-Masonry gift shop within a mile north of the house; however, they were not veneered by Silas Owens, Sr. The residential area of Clinton in the vicinity of the town square also contains a few Craftsman Mixed-Masonry examples but the rock masons are unknown at this time.

The rockwork on the Walter Patterson House was attributed to Silas Owens, Sr., by his son, Silas Owens, Jr., in 2002. The herringbone pattern favored by Owens, Sr., is prevalent at the foundations of the front and side elevations and is used in combination with a geometric coursing using tidy rectangular and square stones.

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Oral history on the Walter Patterson House obtained from local individuals and previous and current owners regarding original ownership yielded little information about the initial builder or subsequent owners. An examination of Van Buren County tax records was more rewarding; however, the thread of owners was interrupted by the absence of tax books between 1951 and 1948 so a final say on the 1946 title-holder would be largely speculation. It is also not known if the house was constructed with a stone veneer or whether the stone was applied over a frame structure but the circa 1946 construction date would be the appropriate period for the popularity of the Mixed-Masonry and the productive years of Silas Owens, Sr.

The 1946-1948 Van Buren County tax records document Elmer Huyck as the owner of a property consisting of the same amount of acreage in the same township, range and section as previously recorded owners of the Patterson House. The 1951 records list Walter Patterson as the owner until 1954. Patterson was also the owner of the Walter Patterson Filling Station in downtown Clinton (NR 02/09/01), which was constructed in 1936 for Patterson and his wife Anna. The house passed through various owners from 1954 to 1996 when Duane Richards of North Little Rock purchased it. Richards, a Southern Baptist minister, resided in the Crystal Hill area of North Little Rock while renting the house in Clinton. In 2004 he sold the home to Gerald and Kathleen Coogan of Choctaw, proprietors of a home decorating store in Clinton, who continued renting the house to Oak and Susan Funston. Oak, who is from Highland, Illinois, met his wife Susan from El Paso, Texas, in Oklahoma. The couple moved to Clinton in 2003 with their then seven-year-old son and nine-year-old daughter and rented the Walter Patterson House from Duane Richards. In 2006 the house was purchased by the Funstons as a primary residence.

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
