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## National Register of Historic Places Continuation Sheet

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#### Description

Standing amidst several large shade trees, the Letona Hotel is one of the few visual reminders left from the days when this small White County town was a lumber shipping point on the Missouri and North Arkansas Railroad line. The hotel, which is now used as a duplex, is intact and in good condition, and has undergone only a few minor alterations since its construction around 1910.

The two-and-a-half story, irregular floorplan is frame and covered in novelty siding. The alterations to the building include three new windows along the north, south and east elevations, a new balustrade on the second-story porch, and a brick interior chimney on the north side replacing one on the south elevation that was destroyed by fire.

The hotel's front porch extends halfway across the front (east) elevation and is divided into upper and lower levels. The lower porch is supported by large columns, while the upper porch has turned posts, a shed roof and the new balustrade. There is another porch extending halfway across the rear (east) elevation that is also supported by turned posts, although it is only a single story in height. All of the hotel's windows are one-over-one, double-hung sash. Its two original front doors leading into the interior are still intact. The foundation consists of continuous block footing; the original roof is a gable-on-hip shape covered in metal.

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#### Significance

The Letona Hotel is being nominated under National Register Criterion A with local significance for its association with and contributions to the economic development of the community of Letona. As stated in Historic Context 3: Railroad Era, Letona's birth was primarily caused by the growth of the Doniphan Lumber Mill located nearby. When the Missouri and North Arkansas Railroad line was laid through the area in 1908-09, the Doniphan Company made the necessary connections to it by building a logging railroad from the planned Letona townsite to the Ozark Plateau and then using the M & NA tracks to reach the mill from Letona. After its establishment in the early 1900's, Letona quickly grew under its milling and railroad influences. Several sawmills were constructed in town, and the hotel was built directly across from the railroad depot to house the railworkers and the lumber agents who began traveling in the area. When the Doniphan Company relocated their branch line north of Pangburn in search of uncut pine, Letona continued to ship lumber from its own sawmills and concentrated on its agricultural industry, but with its great lumbering asset gone, the need for a hotel was diminished.

Architecturally, the hotel was not built in any particular style, a practice that is distinctive of most small railroad boom towns from the turn of the century. Vemacular architecture, even for large, nonresidential buildings, was the common construction method while the railroad tracks were being laid, because the goal was to provide expedient and inexpensive housing for the rail workers, merchants and residents who quickly populated the new town. Therefore, although it does not express high artistic values or the work of a master, the Letona Hotel is a good representation of a type, period and method of construction found during the railroad era in White County, and for this reason should also be considered eligible under Criterion C with local significance.
