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The livestock barn at the Blunt House is a one-and-one-half story, wood frame, animal and feed building. It retains a transverse crib floor plan with a central runway in the gambrel roof section; an open, shed roof hay drive extends to the east. A smaller, metal shed is also attached to the southern elevation. It rests upon both continuous stone foundations and stone piers; its walls are board-and-batten; and the entire structure is covered with a metal gambrel roof.

The northern or main elevation is accessed via three single-leaf entrances placed symmetrically across the first floor; a central, square hay chute descends from the loft directly above. The hay drive to the east is open. The eastern elevation is relieved only by a single-leaf entrance near the southern end; the southern elevation features only the shed roof addition toward the western wall; and the western elevation is lighted with two window openings (now covered) and a single-leaf entry to the north.

The interior of the gambrel roof section is divided into a continuous open stall to the west, the runway through the center, and to the east, a pair of livestock stalls stand to the north with a separate storage room to the south.

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Significance Criterion C, local significance

The livestock barn at the Blunt House is significant as the best example in the county from this era of White County history (Boom and Bust: The War and Depression Years, 1914-1939; Section E,4) of a one-and-one-half story, gambrel roof, board-and-batten livestock barn constructed c. 1920. Its alterations consist solely of the metal shed addition on the rear of the building and its interior stalls, storage and drive areas are remarkably intact. Gambrel roof barns are common in White County after 1930 but not before; as such, the Blunt House livestock barn is a rare and remarkably intact agricultural resource from this earlier period.

This barn was constructed by Albert Blunt c. 1920. Blunt built the barn approximately 30 years after building the residence (severely altered) on the same site. It is in good condition.

Verbal Boundary Description:

Beginning at the point formed by the intersection of the northern edge of County Road 357 with a perpendicular line running parallel to the western elevation of the barn and located 50 feet to the west thereof, proceed northerly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the barn's northern elevation; thence proceed easterly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the barn's northern elevation; thence proceed easterly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the barn's eastern elevation; thence proceed southerly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a line running along the northern edge of County Road 357; thence proceed westerly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to the point of beginning.

Boundary Justification:

The entire farmstead surrounding this resource could not be included due to the drastic alterations that have occurred to the other associated historic resources; therefore, this boundary includes all the property historically associated with this resource that retains its integrity.





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
