During the Boom and Bust Era (1914-1939) in White County a variety of vernacular houses were constructed. They were also built out of a variety of materials. Surviving examples from this period, however, are somewhat limited. The Walter Marsh House is a good example of a one-story double-pile structure that is of frame construction and clad with novelty siding. The hipped roof is covered with composition shingles and the entire structure rests on a stone foundation.

Located on the northwest corner of Maple and Torrence Streets, this building was constructed less than two blocks west of the Missouri and North Arkansas rail line in Pangburn. The Walter Marsh House was constructed c. 1920 and is in good condition. Its main, or east elevation is dominated by a recessed front porch that extends the full-length of the facade. The porch roof is supported by simple wooden box columns that rest on wooden piers. This elevation is relieved by two single symmetrically placed doors that are flanked by single four-over-one double-hung wood sash windows. A single asymmetrically placed door is found on the south elevation of the house. Asymmetrically arranged windows that are either single or paired are found on the other three elevations of the original structure. These windows have light arrangements similar to the windows on the east elevation with one exception. A single-pane sliding window is located on the west elevation of the structure; this window is not original. Hipped roof dormers are found on the eastern and southern slopes of the main hipped roof. Both of these dormers are fenestrated with small paired four-over-one double-hung wood sash windows. The only visible alterations to the exterior are located on the rear of the building. A recessed porch on the northwest corner of the building was enclosed to provide extra space. This room is clad with aluminum siding. A rear-ell, that was originally separated from the main building by a short covered walkway, extends from the west elevation of the house. The northern opening of this walkway has been enclosed. An asymmetrically placed single door accesses the gable roof addition. A single centrally placed four-over-one double-hung wood sash window relieves the west elevation of the addition. Running the entire length of the addition is a porch with a shed roof; the porch roof is supported by wooden posts.

Significance

When this building was constructed, c. 1920, it was one of numerous double-pile buildings built during the Boom and Bust Era (1914-1939). Though there are two hundred and twenty four of these structures extant in the county, few exhibit the amount of integrity found in this house. Because of this, the Walter Marsh House is significant for its contribution to the study of vernacular architecture. For these reasons it is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance.

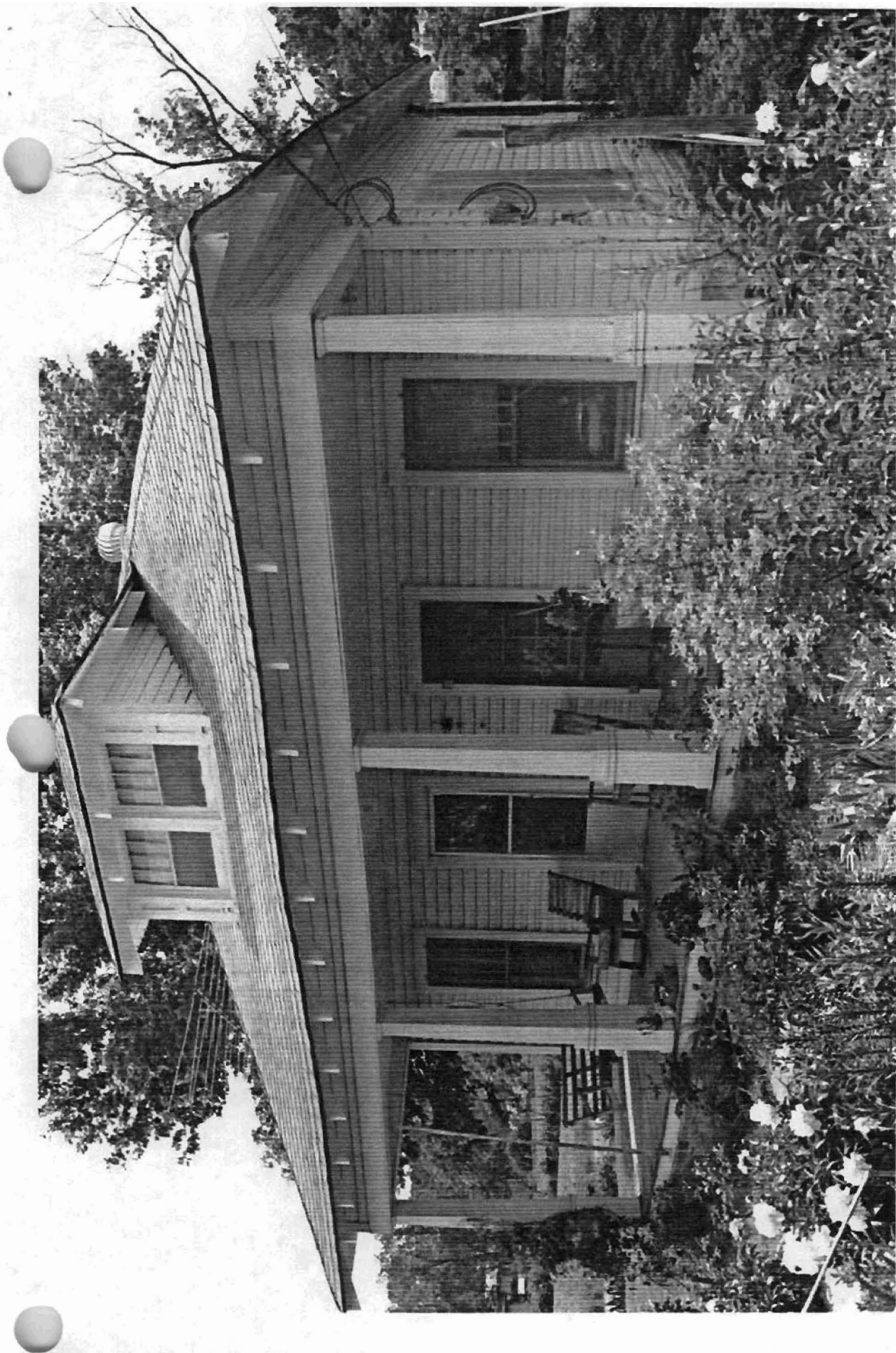

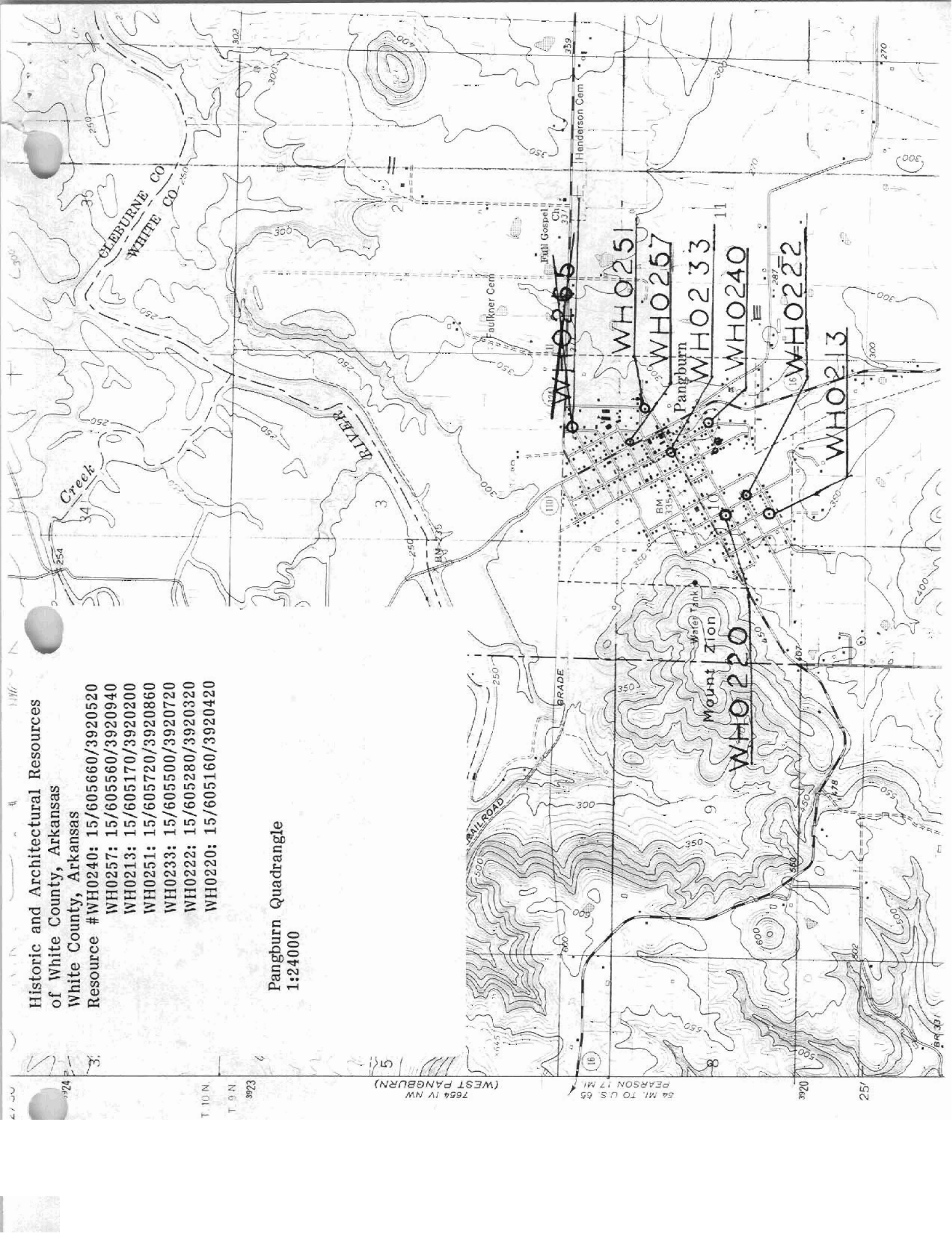
