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Description

During the Railroad Era (1870-1914) in White County a variety of vernacular houses were constructed. They were also built out of a variety of materials. Surviving examples from this period, however, are somewhat limited. The James William Boggs House is a fine example of a one-and-one-half story double-pile building that is of frame construction and clad with weatherboard. The pyramid roof is covered with composition shingles and the entire structure rests on stone piers.

Located on the north side of Austin Street, this building was constructed less than two blocks south of Pangburn's commercial district. The James William Boggs House was constructed in 1908, is currently unoccupied and in fair condition. Its main, or west elevation is dominated by a one-story hipped-roof porch that wraps around to the north side of the house and along the west elevation of the rear addition. The porch roof is supported by tapered wooden box columns that are capped with simple wooden capitals.

Fenestration found on the original block of the house consists of either single or paired symmetrically placed one-over-one double-hung wood sash windows. Symmetrically placed single doors with transoms access the west elevation of the porch. A gable roof dormer rises above the porch on the west elevation of the structure. It is fenestrated with single-pane fixed frame windows that are arranged geometrically with a single window centrally placed on top of a pair of windows. Taller gable roof dormers are located on both the north and south elevations of the structure. These are fenestrated with paired one-over-one double-hung wood sash windows.

A stucco clad corbelled brick chimney is located immediately east of the southern dormer. A shed roof screened porch extends practically the full length of the east elevation of the original house; this porch separates the main building from the rear addition. Centrally placed single doors access both the north and south elevations of the screened porch.

A larger historic addition is attached to the northeast portion of house. This addition is actually a two-room shotgun-style house that was moved in from another part of town. A shed roof screened porch extends across the south elevation of the shotgun. The porch roof is supported by turned posts and simple wooden posts. Fenestration on the east elevation of the addition consists of symmetrically placed single one-over-one double-hung wood sash windows. A similar window is found on the north elevation of the structure and replaces an original door. A solitary brick chimney rises from the center of the eastern slope of the gable roof.

Both the original house and the shotgun addition are very simply decorated. The only embellishments found on the original house other than the geometrically arranged dormer windows are decorative wood panels that surround the other two dormer windows. Cornerboards are also found on the original building. Ornamentation found on the Shotgun consists of wide friezeboards.

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Significance

The James William Boggs House has not always been solely a single family residence. At one time the Pangburn telephone exchange was located on the upper floor of the house while the two-room shotgun addition was a Doctor's office. The shotgun building was actually located on Torrence Street between Austin and Searcy Streets in Pangburn. This previous location is just north of where the structure now sits.

When the James William Boggs House was built by Jim Stoltz in 1908, it was one of numerous double-pile buildings built during the Railroad Era (1870-1914). Though there are thirty-one of these buildings extant in the county, few exhibit the amount of integrity found in this house. For this reason it is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance.
