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Description

The William Henry Watson Homestead is a single story, wood frame dogtrot residence. It features the standard dogtrot plan, with two virtually identical pens flanking an open, central passageway, all of which is covered by a continuous gable roof. The smaller, interior brick chimney in the eastern pen and the fact that it was weatherboarded originally indicate that it was the later of the two pens. The western pen is heated by a massive, stone exterior end chimney and features its original board-and-batten exterior on the gable end and the rear shed, while the front beneath the porch is covered with weatherboard. The western pen also features both a front and side entry (opposite the chimney), while the eastern pen is entered only from the passageway. The continuous porch on the northern or front elevation is probably a form original to the building, though the flooring and roof supports appear to have been replaced in the relatively recent past. The rear shed on the western pen appears to be original, though the rear porch over the passageway is a more recent addition. The entire structure is covered with corrugated metal and supported on stone piers.

The entire building is lighted by four-over-four, double-hung wood sash windows. Two flank the front entrance of the western pen while two more provide the only relief to the northern elevation of the eastern pen. Both the western and eastern pens are lighted by another identical window toward the southern wall of their western and eastern elevations, respectively. One four-over-four double-hung wood sash window has been turned sideways and placed in the southern wall of the rear shed.

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Significance

The William Henry Watson Homestead is named for its builder and original inhabitant, about whom little else is known except for the fact that he was certainly a farmer. The main house which survives as an excellent, intact example of the common evolution of the dog-trot type of residence. This vernacular type was popular among the rural residents who settled White County during the Railroad Era and its appearance was once widespread throughout the county. The obvious "updating" of the residence to include a second, weatherboarded pen with its brick flue reveals the increasing fortunes of its owner and his desire to improve the residence. The William Henry Watson Homestead remains one of the finest examples of this house type from this era in White County; as such, it is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance.

Verbal Boundary Description:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the southern edge of County Road 68 with a perpendicular line running parallel to the western elevation of the house and located 50 feet to the west thereof, proceed southerly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the southern elevation of the house; thence proceed easterly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the eastern elevation of the house; thence proceed northerly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the southern edge of County Road 68; thence proceed westerly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to the point of beginning.

Boundary Justification:

The original lot has been subdivided during the non-historic period, resulting in an indefinite current lot boundary; therefore, this boundary includes all the property historically associated with this resource that retains its integrity.
