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Description

The Brown House is a single story, wood frame Craftsman residence. The projecting gable roof porch entry enlivens what is actually an only slightly disjointed plan beneath a single principal gable roof. Three interior brick chimneys—one near the front and the other two near the rear--rise through the roofline. The roof material is composition shingle, the walls are brick, and the foundation is concrete block.

The western or front elevation is dominated by the gable end with its recessed corner porch and perpendicular gabled porch roof. The gable end is stuccoed in the pediment and punctuated only by a horizontal group of three louvered vents. The brick wall below (to the north) is lighted with a group composed of two three-over-one wood sash windows flanking a four-over-one wood sash window. To the south, the recessed porch is accessed through single door entrances in both the south and west walls, and both entrances feature glass transoms. The wall to the south of the west wall entrance is lighted with a single four-over-one sash window. The porch is supported on three brick columns set upon a low, stuccoed wall with pedestals and stoops for the stairway.

The southern elevation consists of the projecting gable roof porch to the west and the side wall to the east with the enclosed porch on the eastern end terminating the elevation. A pair of four-over-one wood sash windows light the wall beneath the porch, two single, smaller windows of the same type light the center of the wall, and a larger pair of the same type light the end of the brick wall. The original rear porch has been covered with artificial siding and an entrance has been placed in this elevation. The northern elevation is also lighted with four-over-one wood sash windows in a variety of groupings and sizes and is surmounted by a stuccoed doghouse dormer lighted with a pair of wood sash windows.

The eastern elevation features only the projecting, gable roof, filled porch element with its central modern entrance and a single four-over-one wood sash window in the brick wall to the north.

All elevations feature either triangular knee braces or exposed rafters along the cornices. An original gable roof, brick garage building is included with this nomination.

The Brown House has suffered the enclosing of the original rear porch but is otherwise intact. It is in good condition.

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Significance

Criterion C, local significance

The Brown House (Part E, Historic Context #4) is the best example in Bald Knob of a single story, wood frame Craftsman style residence clad in brick. Typical of other Craftsman designs of the mid-1920's, the details characteristically associated with this style are being reduced in scale and chiefly isolated to the comice line. Furthermore, the plan reflects the trend toward pulling all living spaces inward and beneath a single roof form. As such the Brown House is typical of the second phase in the evolution of the Craftsman house designs in White County, in which the wings and appendages tend to be placed more symmetrically around the house block and beneath a single, all-inclusive roof form, despite the continuing tendency for the elevations to exhibit an asymmetrical, picturesque aspect.
