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Description

During the Railroad Era (1870-1914) in White County a variety of vernacular houses were constructed. They were also built out of a variety of materials. Relatively unaltered examples from this period, however, are somewhat limited. The Hoag House is a good example of a how a simple vernacular building was historically altered to include stylistic additions. The building is currently clad with weatherboard, has both gable and pyramid roofs that are sheathed with metal and the entire structure rests on a stone foundation.

Located one-quarter mile northeast of the intersection of State Roads 157 and 367, this building was constructed one mile northeast of downtown Judsonia. It was constructed c. 1900, is currently unoccupied, and is in fair condition. The original portion of the structure was a two-story gable entry building that was clad with board and batten. A corbelled brick chimney rises from the gable peak in what was once the central portion of the building. The building has since been added to. The two-story, pyramid roof portion of the building was added to the north elevation of the original structure. Gable roof dormers adorn all sides of the roof except the south elevation.

A single door enters the ground floor of this portion of the building on the east elevation. This door opens onto a one-story wrap-around porch. Chamfered posts supporting the shed roof are adorned not only with simple capitals and balustrade but with decorative spindle work brackets as well. Symmetrically placed one-over-one double-hung sash windows are found on both floors of this addition. In fact, this type of window is found on all elevations in either single or paired groups. All gable ends, except on the west and south elevation additions, have been adorned with decorative jig saw and spindle work designs. A wrap-around porch is found on the southwest corner of the structure. Although it is deteriorating chamfered posts are still in evidence.

A corbelled brick chimney is asymmetrically placed in the gable peak of this corner of the building. The western half of the north elevation plays host to a shed roof porch; most of this has been enclosed. A single column that is similar to ones found on the main wrap-around porch is the only surviving detail.

Approximately one hundred yards west of the house is a gable roof storage building. It was probably built at the same time as the main structure. The gable roof is clad with metal while the walls consist of board and batten. A ventilator rises from the gable peak.

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Significance

When this building was constructed c. 1900, it was one of numerous box constructed houses built during the Railroad Era (1870-1914). What sets the Hoag House apart from the rest of the box houses is that it was originally built as a two-story gable entry building. Most box houses in White County were one-story side entry structures.

Even though there have been several frame additions to the original structure they are historic and reflect the period of their construction. The abundance of wood ornament and the gable dormers are indicative of the Folk Victorian influence in rural Arkansas. For these reasons this house is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance.

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Verbal Boundary Description:

Beginning at the point formed by the intersection of a line running parallel to the southern elevation of the house with a line running parallel to the eastern elevation of the house (located 1,175 feet east of State Highway 157 and 425 feet north of State Highway 367), proceed northerly along the latter line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to the point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the northern elevation of the house; thence proceed westerly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the western elevation of the associated outbuilding; thence proceed southerly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the southern elevations of both the associated outbuilding and the house; thence proceed easterly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to the point of beginning.

Boundary Justification:

The original lot has been subdivided during the non-historic period, resulting in an indefinite current lot boundary; therefore, this boundary includes all the property historically associated with this resource that retains its integrity.
