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Description

The Caldwell House is a single story, wood frame Craftsman residence. Its highly unusual combination of gabled, hipped and disjointed roof elements indicates an irregular floor plan. One exterior brick chimney rises from the east elevation of the house, just inside the end of the wraparound chimney, and the other rises from the center of the western slope of the main gable roof section. The roof is covered with composition shingles, the walls are weatherboarded, and the continuous foundation is constructed of brick.

The western or front elevation is composed of the main gable end portion of the house in the center with a projecting, smaller gable end to the north and a perpendicular gable roof porch abutting the south wall of the north gable and extending south. Both gable end pediments are decorated with imbricated shingles and the porch is supported on short, panelled, slanted wood columns set on slanted brick piers. The northern gable end is fenestrated with a tripartite group of wood sash windows consisting of a large, central twelve-over-one window flanked by two narrower windows of the same pane configuration. Beneath the porch, a single twelve-over-one wood sash window lights the wall between the side wall of the gable and the entrance, and another lights the wall to the south of the entrance.

The southern elevation is composed of the gable end of the porch to the west and another, smaller gable end at the eastern end of the elevation with a section of connecting wall plane between them. The porch gable end is decorated with the same imbricated shingles in the pediment and the same squat columns on piers. The wall to the east contains one fixed twelve-pane window and a modern sliding aluminum and glass door. The eastern projecting gable bay is fenestrated with a pair of twelve-over-one wood sash windows in the center and is also lighted with a single wood sash window in its western side wall. The northern elevation is a continuous wall plane and is fenestrated with two single twelve-over-one wood sash windows symmetrically-placed to either side of a pair of identical sash windows.

The eastern elevation features yet another gable bay in the center and the side wall of the southern gable bay. A single twelve-over-one wood sash window lights the center of the gable end and a pair of identical windows light the side wall of the southern gable.

The Caldwell House has suffered few alterations. The addition of the sliding door on the southern elevation constitutes the only noticeable change to the design. The Caldwell House is in good condition.

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Significance Criterion C, local significance

The Caldwell House (Part E, Historic Context #4) is the best example in McRae of a single story, wood frame Craftsman bungalow. The design is remarkably successful not by virtue of its detail but rather by the proportion of the essential components to each other and their placement. The size of the two front, flanking multi-pane sash windows relative to the entrance and the use of wider and narrower twelve-pane windows in the tripartite window designs is especially noteworthy. The geometric, almost Japanese decorative brackets are also an example of the simple yet appropriate decoration which frequently appeared on Craftsman homes.

Probably the most remarkable feature of the Caldwell House, however, is the fact that the abundance of intersecting roof forms and the irregular roofline they produce shelter a relatively contained and balanced floor plan. The front porch projects beyond the wall only slightly, and the southern gable ends, though quite irregular in elevation, do not extend so far from the main house block that they radically alter the fundamentally square plan. As such the Caldwell House is typical of the second phase in the evolution of the Craftsman house designs in White County, in which the wings and appendages tend to be placed more symmetrically around the house block and beneath a single, all-inclusive roof form, despite the continuing tendency for the elevations to exhibit an asymmetrical, picturesque aspect.
