### **BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION**

### **ELABORATION**

The Crossett Municipal Auditorium was built in 1953-54 in the Art Moderne Style, with an exterior of gray brick. The building was designed in a curved fashion to assist with acoustics inside. The roof is a tar, flat roof. This building includes seating for 1,009, a stage, downstairs dressing rooms, light booth, lobby, ticket booth, box office, and upstairs restrooms.

### Front/Southeast Façade

The front entrance of the auditorium faces southeast. Several large steps lead to the front entrance of three sets of double doors. Brick planters accent the staircase and the front of the building. Large squares of

nestone highlight the entryway and spread out almost to the curved front corners of the building. Above the front doors are three awning windows.

### Side/Northeast Façade

The northeast, or right, side of the building is adorned with a set of glass double doors and tall, thin, rectangular windows. The windows are comprised of two columns of seven windows each. The gray brick exterior continues along this wall.

### **Rear/Northwest Façade**

The northwest side, or back, of the building has sharper corners and straight walls. The stage is located on the interior of this end of the building. A rolling dock door for moving props is located on the west side of the building.

### Side/Southwest Façade

On the southwest, or left, side of the building is a concrete porch and a single door that leads to the backstage area. A set of glass double doors and tall rectangular windows mirror those on the northeast wall. At the time of construction, the building was connected by a covered walkway to the Crossett High School (later Norman Junior High). Though the school has since been torn down, a portion of the walkway still remains. This walkway features large, white, concrete columns and connects to the side entrance glass doors on the southwest side of the building.

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# National Register of Historic Places Continuation Sheet

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### SUMMARY

The Crossett Municipal Auditorium at 1100 Main Street in Crossett, Ashley County, Arkansas, represents an excellent example of the Art Moderne style in Crossett. As a result, it is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C with local significance. The building is also significant for its associations with the efforts of the Crossett Company to provide facilities for the community, including facilities for recreation and entertainment. The Crossett Municipal Auditorium is also being nominated to the National Register under Criterion A with local significance.

### **ELABORATION**

Crossett was founded around the turn of the nineteenth century in southeast Arkansas. The town was founded to house a sawmill and lumber company. Most of the leadership and capital for the establishment of the Crossett Lumber Company came from three families. The Crossett Company was started as a lumber operation, but soon developed into a number of wood-using industries. The first mill manager and co-owner of the company, E. W. "Cap" Gates, was the visionary behind the town.

Juring this era, company owned sawmill towns were common. This meant that the company owned "everything." You worked for the company, lived in a company house, shopped at the company store, sent your children to company-owned schools, and received company scrip as pay. Until 1946, every business and building in town, except a café, pressing shop and post office were company owned and operated. In 1946, due to the increasing size of the town, a new development plan was established and homes were sold to company employees. At this time, Crossett began its evolution from a company-owned town to a town with a thriving company at the base of its economy.

Crossett was named one of the 100 finalists in the 1953 All-America Cities Contest, sponsored by *Look Magazine* and the National Municipal League. "The City with a Plan" was the town's slogan, and it was true. In 1940, Crossett became the first planned city in Arkansas when the nation's leading city planners prepared the first plan for a future Crossett of 5,000 people. In 1953, the renowned firm planning firm of Harland Bartholomew & Associates of St. Louis, Missouri, completed months of tedious effort and presented to the City of Crossett a plan for a future Crossett of 25,000 people—five times the size. Crossett was the only city in the United States under 100,000 in population having a comprehensive city plan embracing all elements of community facilities. Many improvements were made to this already progressive town during the early 1950s.

Crossett had a rich history of public facilities, though none were long lasting. During the early days of the town, the Crossett Company saw to it that their employees were provided respectful entertainment and recreation by building a Natatorium, Clubhouse, Bandstand, and even a Carousel. However, as the years used these facilities were lost to fire or torn down to make room for new facilities. The citizens began to -reel the need for entertainment in their town.

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In December 1952, the Crossett Company answered the long-felt need for a community auditorium by donating the funds to cover the construction costs. An initial donation of \$125,000 was given to the school district in 1952, with additional donations to cover the remainder of the costs to be given the following year as needed. This facility was built to dually serve the needs of the community and the school and would be maintained by the school district. "We hope that this auditorium will provide facilities that have been lacking for cultural entertainment and at the same time provide a meeting place for any community gathering," a spokesman for the Crossett Companies said when announcing the donation.

In general, plans called for an auditorium with a seating capacity of nearly 1,000, with an entrance lobby, ticket booth, and service rooms. Dressing rooms would be located beneath the stage. The auditorium floor would be bowled and stepped to give each seat in the house excellent vision, and the building would be shaped to afford excellent acoustic conditions with sound absorbing surfaces. The auditorium was located approximately 80 feet north of the high school. The exterior appearance of the building was designed to be in "harmony" with the high school, and the two building were joined with a covered walkway. Though the shool has since been torn down, a portion of the walkway still exists. Completed in the spring of 1954, the "general construction cost for the building was \$158,484, which did not include heating, electrical and plumbing costs.

The completion of the Auditorium sparked locals into action. A group of progressive and interested citizens joined together to form the Crossett Cooperative Concert Association, whose mission was to bring the finest music and entertainment to Crossett. The organization's membership drive featured a free concert by world-famous opera, radio, and television star Jane Stuart Smith. The 1954-55 season featured five performances: Alexandre and Gaines, Soprano and Baritone; Nelson and Neal, Duo Piano; Ruthana Boris Dance Company; The Chanticleers, Male Quartet; and the St. Louis Sinfoniette.

Though currently the auditorium is primarily used by the Crossett Public School system, it has over the years served as a location for community meetings, medicine shows, concerts, touring theatrical programs, pep rallies, assemblies, funerals, political gatherings, pageants, local recitals and much more. The stage has been the site where young ballerinas performed in their first dance recital, where each Crossett Homecoming Queen has been crowned, and where talented instrumentalist wowed their parents at band concerts. The stage has also hosted Tony award-winning vocalists, world-renowned conductors leading the Arkansas Symphony, and headlining country music recording artists. For recent generations of Crossett youth, few buildings will hold such a wide variety of memories as the auditorium.
